INVERSION
The term <i>inversion</i> covers different grammatical operations: questions, exclamations, conditional sentences, etc. We are going to focus on two structures:
1. Using a question form of the main verb.
<b>Not only did he fail</b> to report the accident, but also later denied that he had been driving the car.
Never have I enjoyed myself more.
2. Changing the normal positions of verb and subject.
On the grass <b>sat a little frog.</b>
Inversion can occur when an adverbial, usually negative, is placed at the beginning of a clause. This is done to emphasize the adverbial. Compare:
I have never enjoyed myself more.
Never have I enjoyed myself more.

**No sooner had I reached** the door **than** I realized it was locked.

**Only then did I understand** what she meant.

Only after her death was I able to appreciate her.

Not a single word did he say.

**Little did he realize** the danger he faced.
